- A motion was made and approved to accept the November minutes.
- ◆ TREASURER'S REPORT Envelope offerings are still low. A \$20,000 check was received from the sale of the property of Nazareth Lutheran Church. A motion was made and approved to accept the Treasurer's Report.
- ♦ \$20,000 GIFT DISTRIBUTION REPORT 1) A motion was made and approved to add enough to the General Fund to cover the 2016 budget deficit balance and the remainder to the New & Enhanced Ministry Fund.
- ♦ 2) A motion was made and approved to **donate \$500 to Lutheran Charities** (200 to Comfort Dogs, 200 to Military Dogs and 100 to the General Fund).
- ◆ 2106 BUDGET REPORT A motion was made and approved to accept the budget as presented by Tom, and bring it to the Voters in January.
- ♦ THRIVENT REPORT Donna is on the South Cook Chapter Board and explained that the board is closing in September 2016, the fund raisers will be different. A motion was made and approved to host two South Cook Chapter meetings June 8, and August 10 at 7 pm in 2016.
- ♦ EVANGELISM REPORT Four of our people including Terry helped out at the recent Alsip Christmas event. The Chamber of Commerce asked if our church would participate next year.
- ◆ TRUSTEE'S REPORT The fundraising goal for the parking lot is \$55,000.
- ♦ SOCIAL MINISTRY REPORT The owner from Positively Heaven donated a large amount of hats, scarves, & gloves that are being collected for PADS.
- ◆ <u>CHRISITAN ORGANIZATIONS REPORT</u> The Carsons' fund raiser sales were low this year.
- ◆ NEW BUSINESS REPORT A motion was made and approved to give our non-paid musicians a \$50 gift card (Mike & Kevin Habrelewicz, Barb Piekosz). Lenore will receive a \$25 gift card.
- The next Council meeting is January 18. The next Voters' meeting is January 24 after the late service.

LUTHERAN CHILD AND FAMILY SERVICES

"A Lifetime of Positive Relationships" February 2016

Your first childhood memory is likely to be of an event that occurred when you were four or five years old. Early recollections seem to be related to the onset of language. Interestingly, much of what we learn about relationships occurs in the years prior to our memories. Our experiences as infants and young children become the prototype for relationships later in life. In nurturing parent-child relationships we survive and thrive.

The day an infant is born a special exchange begins between parent and child. The infant cries and the parent tries to soothe and comfort the infant. If a caregiver is sensitive and responsive, the child begins to experience security and comfort when they are together. The parent provides a secure attachment. There are three main components to a secure attachment relationship:

- Physical connection, which means plenty of comforting touch and eye contact
- Emotional connection with parents responding accurately to cries and needs
- An environment that is consistent, predictable and safe

These same components remain essential for life. An infant who experiences secure attachment becomes a child who has positive peer relationships, a positive sense of self, experiences joy and learns to regulate his or her emotions. These relationship skills continue throughout life.

Emotional connection problems occur when a parent is unavailable or rejecting, care is inconsistent or when a child's needs remain unseen or ignored. An infant who experiences an insecure attachment can become a child who struggles with peer relationships, has clingy and anxious behaviors, cannot cope in stressful situations and has a negative sense of self.

Patterns of parent-child attachment are passed on from one generation to the next. But it is never too late to create positive change in a parent-child relationship. Your relationship is the foundation for your child's future relationships.

You and your family do not have to struggle alone. LCFS counselors help families generate hope



WHAT IS YOUR LUTHERAN CHURCH - MISSOURI SYNOD DOING IN MISSIONS?

Overview — Past and Present



The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod has been involved in mission and outreach since 1851, when it established its first mission board.

In 1894, the LCMS sent its first overseas missionary, Rev. Theodore Naether and family, to India.

Today, the LCMS trains, sends and supports called and appointed career, long-term and short-term missionaries in various countries around the world where there are mission stations, partner churches, schools or mission relationships.



Role of a Missionary — What Do Missionaries Do?

The main priority of a missionary is to bring the saving Gospel of Jesus Christ to people who have never heard the Good News. LCMS missionaries usually share that Good News in the language of the people they serve.

When the Holy Spirit begins to gather people into Christian fellowship, missionaries assist these new Christians in forming their own indigenous church leaders.

LCMS missionary teams are made up of people who focus on planting churches, leadership formation or some type of locally initiated holistic services in areas of health, agriculture, community development, English-as-a-

Foreign-Language classes or partner support activities.

Missionary teachers also serve in international schools where missionary children, expatriates, and often national children attend. Agricultural and medical missionaries are utilized when their work will strategically contribute towards reaching and gathering a communities of believers, so that churches can be planted.

Missionaries usually spend a good deal of time when they first arrive on the field developing language skills and learning about the culture and mastering a foreign language.

The overall LCMS mission "team" consists of ordained pastors, directors of Christian education, directors of Christian outreach, deaconesses, teachers, lay ministers, Directors of Parish music, medical professionals, agriculturalists, vicars, church work program interns, retired Lutheran laity and college graduates. All are scattered across the globe working together with national partners to tell the Good News of the salvation that is found only in Jesus Christ.
