### "FAITH FRUITFUL IN WORKS"

James 2:24 (MSG) "Is it not evident that a person is made right with God not by a barren faith but by faith fruitful in works?"

I still remember the days, when, as a child my mother would gather my brother, sister and myself up on warm summer mornings and we would walk next door to the Essig Farm to pick blueberries. I'm sure mom picked blueberries to get a little extra money for the family and we came along because she didn't know what else to do with us. We couldn't be left alone. We were too young. Rather than leave us to fool around in the blueberry fields while she picked fruit we picked fruit too. Of course we always were under the watchful eye of Virginia Essig- the matriarch of the fruit farm. She made sure that we picked the blueberry bushes clean- not just the fat ones - not just the low lying ones but also the small ones and the high ones nearly out of our reach. Then, when we picked a carrier full of blueberries and brought them to the shack she would pay us 50 cents. 50 cents we got for picking what seemed to last half a day. Half a day of picking in sometimes hot, cold, dry or rainy weather fending off the bees and the boredom. Sure, we didn't like it, we complained. But we sure did like to get and spend our 50 cents. With our 50 cents we could later go to the Ben Franklin

store in our little town and spend it on a toy watch, candy, or something else we totally didn't need. We had great joy in picking out something for ourselves. Even as children, we had faith as we worked that our blueberry picking would see monetary reward.

As faith in the blueberry fields produced its reward, so does faith in Christ lived out in action during the summer months have its rewards. We are now approaching the months of July and August. We probably are looking forward to vacations, barbeques, family gatherings, warmer and drier weather. Unfortunately for many, they will not include God in their preparations for summer activities. On the one hand one can certainly understand that since we live in Illinois where we do have 4 seasons and, like this year, it seemed the winter months lasted longer than usual. We want to get outside and take care of our gardens and maintain our lawns. But, in all our busyness and enjoyment of the great outdoors, worship of God and His Son, our Savior Jesus, can get left in the dust. Perhaps we don't mean to but it does happen. Just think for a few minutes the reasons why we should include God this summer:

1: God is with us to protect, care and save us 24/7. The bible tells us that "in Him we live and move and have our being." In other words, our ability to take and enjoy a vacation is all within His power and love. Without Him there is no life and obviously no enjoyment of life. He should be respected and worshiped every week.

2: We sin daily. We need God's forgiveness in Jesus Christ every day. Thank God that He sent Jesus to be our sin substitute on the cross. ### **OVERCOMING CRISIS**

Life is unpredictable. Personal tragedy and natural disasters are just two examples of things that can leave us fearful and still weigh on our minds for years after they take place. Maybe you have experienced a tragic event in your life that changed your view of life.

When people experience a crisis or loss they tend to either withdraw because they do not know what to say or talk too much in an effort to try and come to some sort of understanding. The people who care about them want to help, but are unsure as to what they should do. People in crisis exhibit symptoms such as disorientation, panic, defeat, depression and desperate attempts to get relief.

If you are going through a crisis, allow people to help you. Try to be patient if they say something that doesn't feel right to you. Don't expect to carry on "life as usual." Our bodies change during crisis. There are internal alarms going off and chemicals being released from the brain. Our bodies do the best they can to cope, but it takes time. The intense reactions typically last from four to six weeks, but can continue at a lower level for much longer. The temptation to try and find a "quick fix" from illicit drugs or alcohol can enter the picture, but using them will only delay your need to process the crisis.

If you are a friend or family member of someone experiencing a crisis, don't just offer to help, take steps to do something. Many times people will say, "If you need something call me," but during times of crisis even using the phone may be more than someone can find the energy to do.

Take time to listen. You may not have the answers, but you can show support by letting your loved one talk. Prepare them meals or clean their home, which can be a huge relief for some people. It could be that your loved one doesn't want to talk, but just wants your company. Let them know that you are willing to sit with them, without the expectation of taking part in a conversation.

There is no way to predict tragic situations, but living your life in expectation of crisis could prevent you from experiencing the joys life has to offer. You and your family do not have to struggle alone. LCFS counselors help families generate hope and cope with life's challenges. ### **BIBLICAL STEWARDSHIP**

1. The principle of ownership.

The psalmist begins the 24th psalm with,

The earth is the LORD's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it. In the beginning of Genesis, God creates everything and puts Adam in the Garden to work it and to take care of it. It is clear that man was created to work and that work is the stewardship of all of the creation that God has given him.

This is the fundamental principle of biblical stewardship. God owns everything, we are simply managers or administrators acting on his behalf.

Therefore, stewardship expresses our obedience regarding the administration of everything God has placed under our control, which is all encompassing. Stewardship is the commitment of one's self and possessions to God's service, recognizing that we do not have the right of control over our property or ourselves.

Echoing Deuteronomy 8:17, we might say: "My power and the strength of my hands have produced this wealth for me." But Deuteronomy 8:18 counsels us to think otherwise:

Remember the LORD your God, for it is he who gives you the ability to produce wealth.

2. The principle of responsibility.

In explaining responsibility, it is written

Although God gives us "all things richly to enjoy," nothing is ours. Nothing really belongs to us. God owns everything; we're responsible for how we treat it and what we do with it. While we complain about our rights here on earth, the Bible constantly asks, What about your responsibilities? Owners have rights; stewards have responsibilities. We are called as God's stewards to manage that which belongs to God. While God has graciously entrusted us with the care, development, and enjoyment of everything he owns as his stewards, we are responsible to manage his holdings well and according to his desires and purposes.

3. The principle of accountability.

A steward is one who manages the possessions of another. We are all stewards of the resources, abilities and opportunities that God has entrusted to our care, and one day each one of us will be called to give an account for how we have managed what the Master has given us.

This is the maxim taught by the Parable of the Talents. God has entrusted authority over the creation to us and we are not allowed to rule over it as we see fit. We are called to exercise our dominion under the watchful eye of the Creator managing his creation in accord with the principles he has established.

like the servants in the Parable of the Talents, we will be called to give an account of how we have administered everything we have been given, including our time, money, abilities, information, wisdom, relationships, and authority.

We will all give account to the rightful owner as to how well we managed the things he has entrusted to us.

4. The principle of reward.

In Colossians 3:23-24 Paul writes:

"Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving." The Bible shows us in the parables of the Kingdom that faithful stewards who do the master's will with the master's resources can expect to be rewarded incompletely in this life, but fully in the next.

### ROLE OF A MISSIONARY — WHAT DO MISSIONARIES DO?



The main priority of a missionary is to bring the saving Gospel of Jesus Christ to people who have never heard the Good News. LCMS missionaries usually share that Good News in the language of the people they serve.

When the Holy Spirit begins to gather people into Christian fellowship, missionaries assist these new Christians in forming their own indigenous church leaders.

LCMS missionary teams are made up of people who focus on planting churches, leadership formation or some type of locally initiated holistic services in areas of health, agriculture, community development, English-as-a-Foreign-Language classes or partner support activities.

Missionary teachers also serve in international schools where missionary children, expatriates, and often national children attend. Agricultural and medical missionaries are utilized when their work will strategically contribute towards reaching and gathering a communities of believers, so that churches can be planted.

Missionaries usually spend a good deal of time when they first arrive on the field developing language skills and learning about the culture and mastering a foreign language.

The overall LCMS mission "team" consists of ordained pastors, directors of Christian education, directors of Christian outreach, deaconesses, teachers, lay ministers, Directors of Parish music, medical professionals, agriculturalists, vicars, church work program interns, retired Lutheran laity and college graduates. All are scattered across the globe working together with national partners to tell the Good News of the salvation that is found only in Jesus Christ.
