

A MODERN REFORMATION

Proclaiming the reformation Gospel axiom of Scripture alone, Faith alone and Grace alone is something we do with our lives as well as our words—in how we make decisions, in how we use our resources and in how we relate to others.

In the year 1517, on the evening before All Saints, the Castle Church in Wittenberg was prepared for the festival services to be held the next day. Inside the church, 19,000 relics were laid out to be adored by the arriving throng of worshipers.

Outside the church doors, however, a different preparation was under way. There Dr. Martin Luther was busy posting his 95 Theses. This was a courageous act, for he was calling the Church to repentance.

Within two weeks, he not only debated his position in Wittenberg but had his theses translated from Latin into German to be distributed throughout the land.

If Luther were alive today, the title of his theses would be different too. In 1517, they were entitled, "Disputation on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences." Luther was challenging the idea that one could buy his way into heaven. While the Church no longer resorts to raising money through the sale of an indulgence, perhaps Luther would take aim at the lack of vigilance our modern Church has in protecting and proclaiming the pure Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Remembering the Reformation should make us a little bit uncomfortable because the Church in every generation is in need of self-reflection and correction. What needs reforming in our lives and in our congregations?

DO I HAVE TO GO TO CHURCH?

WORSHIP ATTENDANCE IS DOWN

Christian stewardship involves prioritizing time for regular worship attendance. How often do Americans attend religious services other than weddings and funerals? Pew Research Center for the People and the Press reports the following statistics:

- * Once a week or more 40%
- * Seldom never 24%
- * Few times per year 19%
- * Once or twice a month 17%

In declining congregations the majority of regular attenders in the 40 percentile are 45 and over. It seems some younger members have adopted the stance: "I don't have to go to church to be a Christian." Many of them claim to be Christians. They pray. They claim the Christian traits of repentance, saving faith in Christ and the intention to amend their lives. Then why don't they round out their life-style by regularly attending worship services?

WORSHIP ATTENDANCE STUMBLING BLOCKS

Stumble-bum # 1 - "I'm very busy." There are those not opposed to attending worship services. However, a busy life-style robs their available time. It's work time/school time five days a week and Saturdays loaded with household/family responsibilities. Add to this the social/recreational activities and there seems to be little time for worship time.

SOLUTION

Prioritize! Manage time to make time! The Third Commandment (Exodus 20:8-11 & Deut.5:12-15) demands it. Skipping worship without a legitimate reason is a sin to be confessed and removed. Get rid of the bad business of too much "busy-ness" by removing some nonessentials. "Seek FIRST His kingdom and His righteousness!" (Matt. 6:33a) If you are too busy to go to Church you are too busy.

Stumble-you # 2 - "Church is boring." Some find the rote of ritual unappealing. Others complain about "sleepy" sermons and that the choir, music and congregational singing have shortcomings. SOLUTION

Don't go to worship expecting perfection! A negative attitude only begets more negativity. Go to church with a positive attitude believing you'll be blessed in some way, and you will be. A worship service is not mere entertainment. It involves not only "getting" but also "giving". During worship we not only receive God's Word, Sacraments and Absolution, we also give of ourselves by worshiping God, witnessing to others, reaching out in love, sharing each other in fellowship and presenting our tithes and offerings. Make worship exciting by going to church with a positive attitude to receive God's blessings and give of yourself.


WHY GO TO CHURCH?

Are You Really Listening?

"Look at me when I'm talking to you." The speaker (most often an exasperated parent speaking to a child) is also saying, "pay attention, this is important, be respectful of me and what I have to say." When someone tells you that you are not listening to what is being said, he/she may be observing that while your body is there, your thoughts are somewhere else.

Most often you want others to pay attention and be respectful when you speak. How well do you return the favor? Are you listening as well as you could? Following are a few suggestions on how to be more attentive:

- Turn off the phone. Conversations are livelier and more meaningful when they are not competing with your phone, a TV or other distractions.
- Look at the speaker. Pausing from your activity and looking at the speaker conveys the message, "I am listening. I care enough to stop what I was doing and pay attention." (If listening to a child, try getting down to his/her level.)
- Focus on the speaker. Stop thinking about what you are going to do when the conversation is over.
- Hear the person out. This situation can be especially difficult when the message is about you and it is something you don't want to hear. Interrupting, ignoring or walking out are not helpful ways to deal with this uncomfortable moment.
- Acknowledge that you are listening. During the conversation give an occasional nod of the head or an "uh-huh" to convey you're listening.
- Comment on what the speaker said. "Good idea." "I'm glad you told me."

Listening to others is one of the finest gifts you can give. It tells them they are important and that you care enough about them to hear what they have to say.
