Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

Our congregation's Stewardship committee has selected the *New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program* as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

New Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. New Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During 9:15 a.m. morning worship on Consecration Sunday, Nov. 12, we are asking our members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world.

Every attendee and member who completes an *Estimate of Giving Card* does so voluntarily by attending morning worship (9:15 a.m.) on Consecration Sunday, November 12. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship our guest leader, Rev. Thomas Soltis will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration Sunday team and Church Council members. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship.

One-Day Mission Convocation

"Mobilizing the Mission – Start New to Reach New"

Jesus saw a huge crowd and had compassion on them because they were like sheep without a shepherd. Then he began to teach them many things. Mark 6:34

Because of His compassion for the lost, Jesus spent His time teaching the people about His Father's love for them, and demonstrating that love in concrete ways. As His followers, we are moved by that same compassion to share and show the love of Christ in our communities.

The SELC District partners with the Center for United States Missions to bring you this opportunity to learn and discuss, affirm and engage in the mission of God, namely to make disciples of all nations.

This free one-day convocation will introduce you to the single most effective strategy for reaching the lost for Christ. In this "introductory tour" into the world of church multiplication, participants will explore the relationship of the mission of God to the development of new ministries in your church, your community and nearby communities currently without a ministry presence.

Facilitated by Rev. Dr. Peter Meier, Executive Director of the Center for US Missions (LCMS), and sponsored by the SELC District, this convocation will introduce pastors, leaders and interested parties to church multiplication – that is the multiplication of new ministries and new congregations in order to reach new people.

Education, Joy in our Experiences

Imagine that you are a Student in your Senior year at a Christian college, you need to take more theology classes to fulfill your degree, and you have already exhausted all the "easy" options such as New and Old Testament. In a moment of weakness, you give into the peer pressure of one of your good friends who says, "You should take Hebrew, it's fun." A month later, you are going to the same forgotten classroom in the back of the school, five days a week, to learn Hebrew from a professor who

A month later, you are going to the same forgotten classroom in the back of the school, five days a week, to learn Hebrew from a professor who forgets your name and assigns equal amounts of sarcasm as well as homework. The situation does not lend itself to joy. The subject matter is difficult (just ask any minister) and the professor is a wild card, not to mention you are the sole member of the lonely class.

So, if I was to use one word to sum up the experience, what do you think it would be? Regret? Waste? Frustration?

The word is Joy. At the end of that semester I had so much joy associated with that class, and not because it was easy, but because I was having a shared experience with scripture. Often, we share in scripture, but we would hardly call it an experience. Is your average Sunday school an "experience", or just a forgettable hour spent with your "church friends"? While the event may be shared among your peers, we are rarely, truly challenged by such moments in our walk of faith. This where true Christian Education comes into play, with the combination of community and experiential education, we can have a memorable, meaningful relationship with God's Word, as well as those around us. Therefore, I have nothing but fond memories about Hebrew, despite all its quirks and the workload, my soul rejoiced to meditate on God's word with someone else in such a meaningful way. As we approach the Fall's increased programming here at Holy Cross, how can we constantly be challenging ourselves to engage in God's word? There are so many Bible Studies, events and workshops coming up that it can be easy to simply coast through an entire Church season without once partaking in the joy of a shared experience with scripture. The outlook, the expectation of Joy, is what changes these shared moments into true experiences. Brothers and sisters in Christ, don't settle for less, but instead look at every time you interact with scripture as an opportunity to stretch yourself, to approach God's word as a unique, special, and growing opportunity. You may just look back on all those shared experiences with one word: Joy.

Evangelism, what is the LCMS up to?

Did you know that you are not alone when it comes to sharing the Gospel? That sounds like some good news to me!

Not only is there a worldwide network of Christians who are actively seeking to fulfill the Lord's great commission, but there are also some amazing evangelism efforts happening in our own denomination. Here are some of the local, national, and global efforts that are happening in our Lutheran world to bring God's word to the masses:

Everyone His Witness

This program is a newer outreach approach that seeks to equip Christians with tangible, scriptural tools to reach out to their neighbors and friends with the gospel. It is currently a growing and evolving idea with its first module on the LCMS website. One unique aspect is that it desires to use the Small Catechism as a witnessing tool. This is a fantastic effort, since the Catechism can often serve as a bridge between modern language thinking and scriptural reasoning.

Participants learn: What is witnessing? Why do we witness? And the "how-to" of witnessing using the LASSIE approach — Listen-Ask-Seek-Share-Invite-Encourage.

Church Planting

The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod's Office of National Mission is investing significant energy and effort in working with our districts to assist in their church planting efforts.

Church planting can be accomplished through mother congregations, sponsoring circuits, or planting networks that may simply need support to get things started. Partnerships are also formed between struggling congregations in the inner city or rural areas and healthy congregations who wish to help them restart. Worldwide, there are hundreds of LCMS churches and missionaries who are committed to spreading God's word to all nations, everywhere. My own good friends from college are spread from Peru to Slovakia for God's mission to his children. For more information (there is so much to learn about World Missions) just check out LCMS.org!

These are just a few examples of how the great commission, to make disciples of all nations, is truly becoming a reality today. If there is an evangelistic tug at your heart to reach out to others with the Gospel, then know that you are not alone! The call to be God's people is heard far and wide!



Yet I hold this against you: You have forsaken your first love (Rev2:4)

Do you remember your first love? I was five years old when it happened to me. It didn't work out though. It's hard to "go a courtin'" with all of the restrictions that parents put on a five-year-old. Besides, her mother was my grandmothers' boss, so there was that family status thing. (And let's not even talk about the fact that she was Jewish)

Most people experience their first love a little bit later in life. And when it happens it is consuming. The object of your love dominates your thoughts and becomes the center of your life. But alas, for most people, that first love does not last. We move on with our lives and later, if we marry another, we find that our first love was not our true love.

The subject of first love came up a few years ago when I was leading a Bible class on the book of Revelation.
(What a fabulous book that is). The first vision John had was letters sent to seven Christian churches. These were
real churches that existed in Asia Minor. But they represented the entire Christian Church of all time. The letters
were filled with encouragement, praise and warnings for the Christian Church.

In the letter to the church at Ephesus the congregation was praised for several things including the fact that they put false apostles to the test. In other words, they did not listen to false doctrine. But they were also given a warning. *"Yet I hold this against you: You have forsaken your first love"*. Their first love was a steadfast love for Christ and His Gospel. It seems that, while they were eager to hold on to proper Christian doctrine, their first love was no longer their true love.

Should we be concerned about this? Certainly, one of the things that drew me to the Lutheran church is the importance we Missouri Synod Lutherans put on sound Christian doctrine. As we witness other Christian bodies "water down" their doctrine to fit more comfortably into the modern world, we do a good job of testing what we see and hear against the sound Christian doctrine we have learned. And I believe that the praise given to the church at Ephesus applies to us as well. But what about the warning? Does our first love, that consuming love for Jesus and His Gospel, still dominate our lives?

A parallel can be drawn between the Christians at Ephesus and the Pharisees of Jesus day. With them it was the law. In their eagerness to obey God's law, as they understood it, they lost sight of the promised Messiah. They did not recognize Him, even though their knowledge of the Scripture should have made Him stand out. For the Christians in Ephesus, they were eager to test false doctrine against true doctrine, but they put that ahead of their love for spreading the Gospel.

Let us hold fast to the sound Christian doctrine that we Lutherans are so famous for. But let us never forget why we are here. In the following months, Holy Cross will be engaging in serious outreach to the people in our community. I pray that each of us will be ready to "answer the call" to be part of this effort when the call for help goes out. Let the love for Jesus and his Gospel and our eagerness to take it to all those in our community who need to hear it, remain forever both our first and our true love.
